INFORMACIÓN SOBRE LA DEMANDA

1. ¿Por qué está recibiendo este aviso?

Recibe este aviso porque los registros indican que fue detenido y puesto bajo la custodia del Servicio de Inmigración y Aduanas de los Estados Unidos (Immigration and Customs Enforcement, "ICE") en un centro operado por CoreCivic, Inc. ("CoreCivic"). CoreCivic se conocía anteriormente como Corrections Corporation of America.

Individuos detenidos en situaciones similares han presentado una demanda colectiva contra CoreCivic, y esa demanda afecta su derecho a demandar y a recibir cualquier indemnización a la que pueda tener derecho a recibir.

2. ¿De qué se trata esta demanda?

Una demanda contra CoreCivic ha sido certificada como una demanda colectiva en el Tribunal de Distrito de los Estados Unidos para el Distrito Sur de California. La demanda se conoce como *Owino, et al. v. CoreCivic, Inc.*, No. 3:17-cv-1112-JLS-NLS.

En esta demanda se alega que CoreCivic violó la Ley Federal de Protección de las Víctimas de Tráfico (Federal Trafficking Victims Protection Act, TVPA) al coaccionar y obligar a los detenidos a limpiar las instalaciones más allá de las tareas domésticas personales enumeradas en las Normas Nacionales de Detención Basadas en el Desempeño (Performance Based National Detention Standards) del ICE bajo amenaza de castigo. Las áreas que se obligaba a los detenidos a limpiar incluyen las áreas comunes y áreas de recreación, baños, duchas, cafetería, oficinas y cocina, independientemente de que se pagara a los detenidos por su trabajo.

Para los detenidos en California, la demanda alega que CoreCivic violó la Ley de Protección de Víctimas de Tráfico de California (California Trafficking Victims Protection Act, "CATVPA"), además de la TVPA.

En el caso de los participantes en el Programa de Trabajo Voluntario de California, la demanda también alega que CoreCivic violó la ley de California al no pagar a los detenidos el salario mínimo exigido por la ley de California, al no proporcionar recibos de nómina, al no pagar los salarios al ser despedidos y al imponer condiciones de empleo ilegales.

3. ¿Qué es una demanda colectiva?

En una demanda colectiva, una o más personas denominadas "Representantes del grupo" (en este caso Sylvester Owino y/o Jonathan Gómez) demandan en nombre de otras personas (usted) que tienen reclamaciones similares. A las personas con reclamaciones similares se les denomina de manera conjunta "Grupo" o "Miembros del grupo". A las personas que demandaron, y todos los Miembros del grupo como ellos, se les denomina Demandantes. A la compañía que demandaron (en este caso CoreCivic) se le denomina Demandado. Un tribunal resuelve las demandas de todos Miembros del grupo.

4. ¿Qué piden los Demandantes?

Los Demandantes piden el pago de daños y perjuicios y la indemnización permitida por la ley de California y la ley federal, así como los honorarios de los abogados y los costos incurridos en relación con la demanda.

CoreCivic niega haber hecho nada incorrecto y sostiene que no coaccionó ni forzó a los detenidos a limpiar áreas de la instalación fuera de su área personal bajo amenaza de castigo y que no violó la ley federal ni la de California.

CoreCivic también niega haber violado la ley de California con respecto a los participantes en el Programa de Trabajo Voluntario en sus instalaciones de California y solicita una compensación de los salarios adeudados o daños por la cantidad que le costó alojar a los detenidos y operar el Programa de Trabajo Voluntario.

6. ¿Ha decidido el Tribunal quién tiene razón?

No. Al establecer el Grupo y emitir este Aviso, el Tribunal no está sugiriendo que los Demandantes ganarán o perderán este caso. Los Demandantes deben probar sus reclamaciones en un juicio y CoreCivic debe probar su contrademanda en el juicio.

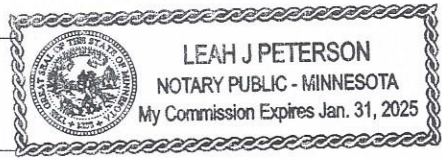



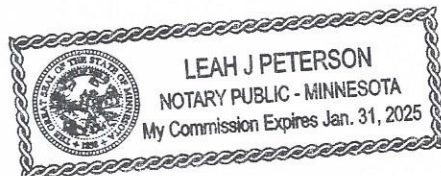
